CASE A: « BIG MONEY » (BEFORE THE ECONOMIC CRISIS)

20-year marriage.

Husband now 45 years old, wife 43.

Two children, now 18 and 15.

No marital contract.

Wife a qualified dentist, gave up her career 15 years ago as a result of a joint decision but started working again 2 years ago, with an annual net income of $\in 50,000 \in (fifty thousand)$.

Husband a banker with annual net income of €3,000,000 (three million), of which 90% is a guaranteed bonus for the next two years.

No assets as the beginning of the marriage. Assets now €40m, of which half was inherited by the husband during the marriage.

1st case-variant:

Shorter marriage (say 5 years)

Children now only 8 and 5

Marital contract providing for a separation of assets.

2nd case-variant:

Divide all numbers by ten: therefore assets now €4m. No money inherited.

Husband's income now €300,000 and wife not working.

The "budget" for now two households is at least €300,000.

CASE B: « SMALLER MONEY »

Same facts as CASE A but different occupations and figures.

Husband is a male nurse. Wife is unqualified and works as a part-time cleaner.

Total capital €400,000; net income €30,000 pa (husband £25,000, wife £5,000).

Of the total capital, \in 300,000 is invested in the matrimonial home, \in 80,000 in the husband's pension and the rest in cash savings.

The couple is still paying a mortgage of \in 50,000 in installments of \in 3,600 per year for another 10 years. The annual budget for now two households is \in 30,000.

Case B-variant: children/relocation:

Wife wants to relocate to Australia:

- (a) where she comes from;
- (b) where her boyfriend comes from.
